Students have been given Bar coded Identity cards in this session. Besides, Ram Lal Anand College has following Modules operational (as below) of Management Information system: 1. Module for online payment of fees by students which take care of annual fees and examination fees charged by students through Adusys (UBI). The fees for certificate courses and FDPS and conferences is also charged online.2. The College has a dedicated module for staff salaries, arrears and income tax calculation, pension, Account ledger, cash book and bank reconciliation. Every month, this autogenerates and sends salary statements to employees through email. 3. There are modules linked for GeM, Eprocurement and Etendering. 4. Library is running with OPAC system functional for easy access and location of books in the library. 5. CCTV and security systems in place. 9. All notices to Faculty are sent through a dedicated email. The notices

for students are sent through sms, email and displayed on website. 6. The college is part of Management Information system of University of Delhi, which gives it access for uploading of practical examination marks, Internal continuous evaluation data and printing of admit card for semester end examination of students. 7. A dedicated admission portal of University of Delhi is in place for online registration, printing of admission forms and confirmation of admission to college. The university also developed a portal for open Book examination (OBE) and evaluation during lockdown with selective access to faculty and students.

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Ram Lal Anand College is University maintained institution and adopted the revised LOCF framework of curriculum prescribed by the University of Delhi in 2019-20. Before each academic session preparations are made for a seamless teaching-learning journey ahead. • College prepares its academic calendar in sync with University Academic calendar. Each constituent department draws its own as well. • Staff council committees and departmental committees involved with allocating workload, preparing time-table, looking after infrastructure begin to work in tandem to ensure proper functioning of teaching-learning from day one of the academic session. • The session begins with orientation program for new students and parents • Duly approved time-table are shared with all faculty through mail, displayed on website and in front of every class rooms for students. • Lesson plan prepared and readings (prescribed/suggested) in the respective papers are made available in the college library and curriculum related references are regularly updated. • Laboratory chemicals, equipment/tools, protocols upgraded as per the curriculum needs. • The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) in tandem with the Academic Affairs Committee monitors effective implementation of the curriculum throughout the year. • Remedial classes scheduled at the end of each semester for needy students to cope with the curriculum. • Educational tours, field projects, seminars, symposia, workshops, alumni interactions, heritage walks, film screening etc. to enhance students' experiential learning besides classroom learning. • Innovations consistently adopted at departmental levels including peer-tutoring and group viva whereby fast learners help more needful students and bilingual teaching-learning (wherever required) • Question banks are regularly updated to ensure students become well-versed with the latest question papers. Use of diverse ICT tools has become a consistent practice. As it happened across educational institutions world over, the global pandemic Covid-19 abruptly forced teaching-learning activity to make a sudden and arduous shift to online teaching-learning. College ensured that a helping hand was extended from an institutional perspective to each student in need. • All faculty members adopted to online mode from mid-March 2020 without any delay. • Teachinglearning continued using ICT tools and in the meanwhile study material was speedily prepared and shared with all students. Those students who faced technologically challenged situations were provided additional support so that they could also be brought at par with others. • Efforts also started to institutionally bridge together each teacher and every student through the adoption of Google-Suite package by the college, later under which formal institutional email IDs were provided to every faculty and all students. Thereafter online classes evolved to become more organized and many other co-curricular and extra-curricular activities also started to gradually re-appear, in online format, on a regular basis. • A number of webinars by distinguished speakers, co-curricular & skill-enhancement courses, extra-curricular activities, online meetings, on Zoho, Zoom and Google Meet platforms, during the latter half of 2019-20 session, is evidence pointing towards the sincerity of our college fraternity in trying its best to limit the huge impact of Covid-19 over the normal functioning of the college.

# 1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

### Feedback Obtained

In its endeavour towards all-round excellence, RLA College has a practice of collecting feedback from all its significant stakeholders. In 2019-20, feedback forms were revised by IQAC and course wise feedback system has been introduced to get more meaningful data. We have institutionalized the mechanism of collecting feedback from all participants after any activity which is organized at the college level. The feedback is collected from students on various

aspects including teaching-learning, curriculum, infrastructure, library by IQAC and discussed in IQAC/respective department meetings. Our principal also interact with students informally. The infrastructural requirements emerging from feedback are forwarded to infrastructure cum building committee for further action. Feedback has been collected from other stake holders of college including parents, employers and alumni in 2019-20. After a rigorous analysis of the feedback from all stakeholders, various actions are prescribed from time to time to facilitate improvement in the teaching-learning process. Example 1: Working on the feedback received from BMS students in 2018-19, an Income Tax Planning add on course was conducted in 2019-20 session to cater to the need of the students who wanted to learn taxation and its implications in real life. A 40-hour duration course, was aimed to train students on basic aspects of taxation. With the implementation of GST magnifying the impact of the taxes in various sectors/industries, it was necessary to introduce such a course for enhancing knowledge of the students which could also enrich their individual profiles with regards to getting placed in renowned companies. The course shall also benefit students preparing for competitive exams like CAT, SSC, and Bank Probationary Officer etc. Example 2: Based on students' feedback Geology Department organized interactive sessions/ lectures of alumni pursuing higher education at reputed institutions or doing exceptionally well at professional levels. Example 3: Political Science Department wherein the inclusion of students' feedback has been mandated in the manifesto of candidates contesting in the departmental society election. This way the accountability of elected office bearers thus can be tracked later on and there also takes place deepening of democratic values among student fraternity. The practice of collecting and working on students' feedback went a notch higher when the teaching-learning exercise shifted to online mode during global pandemic Covid-19. Now collection of feedback has been completely transformed to online Google Forms too and each department (for its events) as well as college continues to collect insightful feedback. The data is regularly discussed in departmental meetings and at the IQAC and Academic Affairs Committee levels. The college consistently tries to improvise teaching quality, extra-curricular activities and career related desires of students by taking feedback insights very seriously. Special certificate courses, coaching classes for competitive exams, add-on courses are being readied and meticulously planned for the near future based on the students' feedback. Collaborations are already in the pipeline and being formalized to begin various activities in association with different kinds of specialized organizations, institutions and experts.

#### 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The Mentor-Mentees concept at Ram Lal Anand College ensures a constant interaction between the faculties and the students. The motto is to help students in infusion of knowledge, guidance, emotional support and helping them in development of character. Staff council secretary undertakes the task and assigns a group of 20-25 students to each faculty member to discuss and counsel them on their academic and personal concerns. A notice/circular is taken out for the same. The major highlights of the concept in 2019-20 are as follows: 1. Unique Inter-departmental approach of assigning students. 2. Minimum of 2 interaction sessions in a month, though mentors are 24 X 7 approachable on phone/Whatsapp/email 3. Register is maintained with entire details of their mentees 4. One to one discussion and guidance over Academic, Financial, Welfare Personal requirements, Career, Higher Education requirements. Guidance to mentees about institution's objectives goals and their role apart from informing them about college activities. We ensure that they get the best possible guidance through our own experiences which could help them in choosing the right path. Even during the nationwide lockdown due to COVID-19 all possible measures were made to interact with students and the Mentors reached out their mentees online using Google Meet, Zoom Meetings and other Online Platforms. Meetings were scheduled frequently so that we are in constant touch with the mentees and all their problems are resolved during this stressful period. During these sessions if the problem is personal, then special care is taken to analyse the root cause of the problem, see how it can be solved and what that particular student thinks about the problem .By getting their views on the problems stated by them, it's easier for us to see and correct their way of looking at the problem. During mandatory field tours the students are encouraged to interact freely with the teachers who accompany them as the students and teachers remain in close proximity for a number of days at a stretch. This period is also used for counselling the students about how to cope with different kinds of pressures. Final year students are also mentored by alumni during alumni interaction to help them analyse job profiles and different

career options after completion of their graduation. Advance learners are also encouraged to take up internships and industry based projects by their mentors. Students are also encouraged to participate in extra activities organisation like management of technical fests, quiz, debates, seminars, workshops etc and to attend field trips so as to make them learn beyond the prescribed course curriculum to motivate and develop confidence in them to help them excel in all fields.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The institution adopted all the evaluation directions issued by the DU vide its ordinance VIII-E for Internal Assessment. The university has taken various initiatives from time to time to improve the level of education like the annual system, semester system, FYUP, CBCS and now LOCF. Internal Evaluation is done for total 25 marks in each course, divided into three components: Assignment, Test and Semester Attendance, in which 10 marks each are given to Internal Test and Assignments, and 5 mark to attendance in each course. In the new COVID 19 guidelines issued by the Delhi University in 2019-20, the evaluation for Internal Practical Assessment was done on the basis of online assignments in the even semester. Also, in this session OBE (Open Book Examination) was conducted for the students due to country-wide lockdown. All the regular classes, assignments, tests and various evaluations were made Online through LMS during this period. Student's subject knowledge is also assessed through direct and indirect methods of assessment methodology/tools like comprehensive examination, objective tests, mock viva etc. Corrected answer scripts are shown to the students for scrutiny. Throughout the semester, academic performance of the students is evaluated by the teachers through various means like Mock tests, e~Quiz, PPT presentations, group discussions, participation in class etc. Few Departments also conduct the Internal Examinations of 2-hour duration is conducted in the mid of each semester for all theory papers, so that each one gets an opportunity to get evaluated. The faculty generally incorporates the dates of submissions and tests in departmental academic calender or through notices. The students going in for camps as in NCC, NSS activities, sports tournaments or other events are generally considered and given extra time if requested. The students who fall sick on day of tests/submissions are also given fresh dates for submission on health grounds. After being evaluated by every faculty member of their respective papers, the entire IA calculation is shared with students and discrepancies are rectified before submission to the teacher-in-charge for review by Departmental Moderation committee, which is constituted in every academic session. The marks are then moderated based on percentage, crosschecking of marks, round-off and other parameters and then the final lists are submitted to IA monitoring committee of college for uploading. After uploading, the marks are displayed prominently on the notice board and website/ shown. A dedicated email id has been created to take up student IA related grievances. A reasonable window is provided to the students to enable them to personally verify the IA marks and report any inaccuracies,

discrepancies and inadvertent omissions to the IA Committee for necessary action. Students personally verify and put their signatures on a copy of the course-wise list of IA marks submitted to the University. Any errors detected at this stage are taken up by the IA Committee and /or Grievance Committee on a case-by-case basis after thoroughly going through previous records and suitably resolved.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Ram Lal Anand College being a constituent college of the University of Delhi follows the Academic Calendar prepared by the University of Delhi for Admissions and Examinations. However, the college and Departments also prepare their Academic Calendars before the start of the session for seamless functioning. The college website has displayed all the information for students regarding examination, examination fees, Pass Percentage, Promotion Rules. During Covid-19 Pandemic, the Academic Calendar of Even Semester 2019-20 (January-May 2020) was revised in accordance with the revision of the academic calendar of the university. The classes/practical sessions were held online through lectures/audio/videos and virtual labs. The Internal Assessments were done through quizzes/tests/assignments taken through LMS (Google classroom/ moodle/canvas). The practical assessments were also done in online mode. The dates of the same were informed to students through emails and website notices. The students of II. Semester and IV semesters were promoted to the next higher semester based on the internal assessment and the previous years performance. The VI semester (final year students of 2019-20) were evaluated through the new OBE (Open Book Examinations) online pattern adopted by the University of Delhi called which was conducted in August 2020. The results were announced by November 2020. A special cell was created in the college to address the concerns of the students appearing in the OBE exam. The teachers of the college evaluated the uploaded answer sheets on the portal of the university. A dedicated tab of Examinations was created on the college website. All necessary information and advisories were shared with students through this tab on the website, and through email and class Whats app groups. A senior faculty member was nominated as Nodal Officer for the Open Book Examinations. College made a committee to oversee the arrangements for students interested to use the IT infrastructure of the college during OBE. Faculty members counseled and guided the students before OBE to ensure students have stress-free examinations. The college office shared all downloaded question papers with students through email and class Whats app groups. The discrepancies in OBE evaluation were also resolved by the college by getting the pdfs of answer scripts of students evaluated and sent to the university for updated result declaration in a timely manner. The Practical examinations were also conducted through an online assessment and evaluation process.

4.4.2 – Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website, provide link)

The college has transparent procedures and policies with respect to utilization of physical, academic and support facilities. The college attempts at optimum utilization of the facilities for the benefit of the stake holders. The Library Committee constituted by the staff council (consisting of teachers in charges of the departments) formulates the library budget on the basis of which funds are earmarked for department wise purchase of books. Any additional funds received by the college for purchase of books are distributed to the departments based on a well-tested formula. The process of purchase of books, its maintenance, weeding out old publications etc. are taken care of by the Librarian, convener and the library staff. Books and journals are purchase based on the recommendations of the Committee and the faculty members. The students and teachers have been given remote access to university library in lockdown. The plagiarism software access is routed through Institutional Academic Integrity panel. The Equal Opportunity Cell and Sugam society makes recommendations with regard to the facilities in the library for differently abled students and faculty members. These recommendations, after the approval of the Principal, are then implemented by the Infrastructure Committee in consultation with the Library Committee and library staff. The infrastructural

needs of the college are looked after by the Building cum Infrastructure Committee constituted by the staff council. Any major infrastructural need of the college is deliberated at length by the members of this committee and recommendations are made to be approved by the Principal/Governing Body. In addition, departments (teaching and non-teaching) send their requisition for specific requirements. Such requisitions are scrutinized by the committee and purchases are made after due approval from the Principal following the GFR rules. The labs are released funds for day to day expenses also. Policies related to the academic and support facilities have been framed keeping in mind the needs of the existing practices in pedagogy and specific requirements of the stakeholders. The committees constituted by the staff council such as Time Table Committee, Work Load Committee, Students Union Advisory Committee, Student Aid and Fee Concession Committee, Infrastructure cum Building Committee, Women Welfare Committee, and Sports Committee etc. look after the academic, financial, infrastructural, and cultural and sports needs of the students. Students and faculty members are encouraged to do research (guided by the Research Committee of the college) by providing college funds earmarked for this purpose. The Extra Curricular Committee encourage students to take part in various cultural activities within the college as well as compete in the cultural festivals at the national level for their holistic growth. The computers and internet maintenance is looked after by a dedicated employee under AMC contract. The college cleanliness contract is under Sulabh International. The strong academic foundation of Ram Lal Anand College is reinforced by the view, that valuable skills, attributes and talents are nurtured through student participation in various academic as well as co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Students Council of the college is a prominent student body. The students' union under the guidance of Students' Union Advisory Committee duly constituted by staff council works to promote a harmonious relationship between the administration and students and forms a vital link between the two. Case Study I Showing Decentralization and Participative Management in the department for Election of Statistics Society (2019-20): Department of Statistics has a society (PANACEA) with one faculty member as its Convener (by rotation) and elected student office bearers. Society strives to organize activities related to the subject giving students ample opportunities to come out as leaders and learn entrepreneurial skills. The faculty member next in line to the Teacher Incharge becomes its convener. A completely democratic process is followed for selection of society office bearers. The Teacher Incharge /Society Convener generally convenes a meeting of all faculty members of the department at the start of academic session to decide about process of election of the society. After due discussion, nominations are invited for various posts and election schedule is notified to the students via a notice that is put up on the departmental notice board (Reference Letter Dated 3/9/2019). The Society follows LYNGDOH Committee recommendations for a fair and impartial election. The nominations received till the deadline are scrutinized by the faculty members. Students are notified about final list of eligible candidates (Reference Letter dated 11/9/2019). The election is conducted as per the schedule results are announced and a signed Copy the list of elected officebearers is sent to the principal by convener for necessary approval. (Reference Letter dated 16/11/2019). The office bearers are then part of organizing team in every event of the society. Case Study II Showing Decentralization and Participative Management in the submission of Internal Assessment records of students (2019-20): The college Internal Assessment Monitoring Committee has the responsibility to submit Internal Assessment (IA) data of students to the university. The committee includes two faculty members, bursar, staff council secretary and the principal. The principal receives notification regarding IA submission from university and forwards it to Convener for necessary action. The Convener discusses/convenes a meeting to decide the process and issues notification to all departmental teachers regarding IA submission stating a deadline (Reference email dated 6/11/ 2019). The committee directs the office staff to send excel sheets for filling data to all departments (Reference Email

from office dated 21/5/ 2020). The Convener also calls for meeting to share any communication received in this regard (Reference letters dated 13/5/ 2020 16/5/202017/5/2020). The teachers Incharge of all department collects IA from all teachers on a particular date (Reference email dated 18/11/ 2019) and convenes a meeting of departmental moderation committee to rectify any mistakes after the respective data has been shown to all students and their signatures taken. The moderated records are submitted to the office. The committee uploads the IA marks on the University portal involving office staff. The teachers from the concerned departments verify the uploaded marks and then are displayed on the college website for students. Discrepancies, if any are reported to IA committee by students through a dedicated email ID. The errors are rectified students notified about the action taken. The hard copy of the same is submitted to the university Examination branch.
